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Beware Thunderstorms!

The ComputerGuys list serve has had lots of discussion lately about equipment getting damaged due to thunderstorms. We recommend the following:

Unplug your modem during thunder-storms. Remember to disconnect it from your phone service too. And unplug your computer. Alternatively, hook everything up via an Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) — computer, monitor and modem. Surge protect your printer separately. With a UPS, if there is a momentary power outage and you are working when this happens, the battery in the UPS should give you enough time to shut down in an orderly fashion. Newer UPS's also have hook-ups for protecting modems.

Remember: Surge protectors protect against the power coming back on, not going off. A UPS protects against both situations. If the power "blinks" while you are working, the UPS will keep your computer humming along without a hiccup. A surge protector only helps insure that the computer is not damaged when the power turns back on.

If lightening is really close to your house and you're using your computer, even if you have a UPS, it's a good idea to shut your system down, disconnect the modem from your phone line, and turn your UPS to OFF.

Glossary and AppleWorks

- Control Panel: A dialog box that lets the user control a set of system parameters.
- Copying: Creating a replica of a highlighted set of data and placing it in the Clipboard.
- CRT Monitor: Cathode ray tube monitor. An output device that generates an image with and electron gun, which illuminates a grid of phosphor dots on a glass screen.
- Curso: The point on the screen where text and numbers are being entered. In word processing programs for the Mac, the cursor is usually displayed as a blinking vertical line between characters.
- Cursor Movement Keys: The four keyboard keys that are labeled with arrows and are used to move the cursor around the screen.
- Cutting: Removing a highlighted set of data and placing it in the Clipboard.
- Daisy-Chaining: Connecting peripherals or computers in sequence.
- Daisy-Chain Topology: A network configuration in which the computers are connected in sequence.
- Data: Raw facts. In a computer, data can refer to numbers, letters, images, or sounds. The compute processes data and turns it into useful information.
- Database: An orderly collection of related information.

Selecting Text in AppleWorks

There are many ways to select (highlight) text in ClarisWorks/AppleWorks.

Whenever text has been typed, it is necessary to select it before changes can be made to that text. Double-clicking selects ONE WORD. Triple-clicking selects ONE LINE. Four clicks selects ONE PARAGRAPH.

Sometimes it is necessary to select text in the middle of a paragraph. Clicking in front of the first character, dragging the mouse while holding the button down to the end of the selection, and then releasing the button will select the text. This can be tricky, especially if you are a new "mouser".

An alternative is the Click, Shift-Click method. 1. Click in front of the first character to be selected. 2. Press SHIFT while you click after the last character you wish to select. As soon as you click the mouse (while pressing SHIFT), the text from the first click to the shift-click will be selected.

If you accidentally selected too much or too little text and you released the mouse button, don't worry! Just press shift and click in the correct place. This way you don't have to keep starting at the beginning to select text.

This time saving Click, Shift-Click method also works when you are dragging to highlight. Press shift and click in the correct places.
