Napster ain't the only game in town

In the wake of last week's release of the UGNN Pollster results for NAPSTER, and this week's court rulings that Napster will have to shut down, we turn our attention to some interesting and promising new alternatives.

Of course you remember Gnutella was the first to appear, not too long ago, promising to be the next hot alternative to Napster. Early in its life it couldn't keep up with the bandwidth demands. Supposedly all those woes have been cured and one might want to try it out again. Guntella works through a decentralized peer-to-peer network, on hosts operated by ordinary PC users. Its claim to fame is the fact that there is no central server or host. So there's no one for the courts to go after. Check it out at http://www.gnutella.wego.com/

Go for a 'Bear Share' of MP3s

For instance, BearShare is a hot one appearing out of nowhere with better bandwidth handling, and greater stability. Bear Share claims to be pulling down some 20,000 to 30,000 file transfers per day. Check it out at http://www.bearshare.net/

3-D Walkaround

Design Your Own Home by Abracadata

This software is a complete home design and remodeling program and fortunately comes with a very good User's Manual. You can either install the software right on your hard drive or work directly from the CD - whichever you choose, you can create stunning 3D creations very easily.

After double-clicking the 3D Walkaround icon, which is a red-roofed house, *Picture* 1 (see picture to the right) appears on your screen.

Working within this area you can "build" your new home room by room. It is suggested that you first use the tutorial chapter in the User's Manual, which starts off with the creation of a living room.

Most of the tools you will need are located on the left side of the screen.

The first thing you will need to draw on the screen are the walls of your room, using the special wall tool. Now this is why the manual is such a pleasant surprise - with all the tools you will need, most people will need to refer to a list to help them pick out the right tool. As you drag your wall tool across the page you will notice that the length is shown, so you will know when you have reached the length wall you want, such as 16 feet, or 20 feet 2 inches, etc.

After you have the four walls of your room created you will want to add furniture. 3D Walkaround comes with a library of various styles of furnishings, windows, doors, etc. To get to this library you would go to the

top menu and select Symbols and then select Open Library Window.

With the symbol libraries menu open you will now be able to choose from many graphics such as art for the walls, drapes, arched windows, couches, loveseats, chairs, kitchen cabinets, lamps - both table and floor, ceiling lights, fireplaces, bedroom, dining room, and bathroom furnishings, as well as so much more.

Picture 2 is a partial view of the Seating library, showing a few of the sofa styles. Note that the sofa lengths are shown as well as whether the sofa has arms or is curved.

Still can't tell if this is the right sofa for your room?

Well this software is called "3D Walkaround" because it does just that - it lets you view the objects you select from the Library by clicking on the 3D Viewer!

The 3D view (*Picture 3*) of the couch I chose spins around in the 3D viewer so that I can decide whether or not this is the right couch for the room being designed.

There are so many graphics that come with this software that you need to go through in order to fill a room that this part of your project could take quite some time. But when you think about the time you are actually saving by doing the remodelling on paper first, and then take into account the money this saves you, then the time you spend on getting your project down on paper first, is well worth the effort.

This is not a difficult software program to learn. The steps are easy. There are a lot of steps and a lot of tools that you will have



to use. There are also sample blueprints for houses and for rooms included in the program. So not only do you have the User's Manual to fall back on, but you can also take a tour of finished project samples.

The view in **Picture 4** is in the 3D Viewer but I chose to make the walls and roof see-through. Normally the 3D Viewer would appear as the couch does above. This view can be turned every which way.

Picture 5 is an aerial view of the living room I made showing an arrangement of furniture, windows, doors, and carpeting. The large X going from corner to corner across the room represents the roof.

One thing that cannot be shown on paper is the actual 3D tour. You can either tour a room of your own creation, or tour one of the sample rooms. The instruction manual says to go ahead and experiment with all the 3D window buttons in the sample rooms because "you can't hurt anything."

After learning the basics and creating a room, it's fun to experiment with the options available such as textures for the walls and floors. Besides textures, you can change an object's pattern with stock patterns or patterns you create.

There is a color wheel that lets you select a color palette so that you can choose colors and patterns that are pleasing to you.

You can move and resize objects. You can also erase parts of an object, which I think is quite unique and helpful.

You can add text to your projects, such as labelling the room or object.

Picture 6 is an aerial view of one of the sample living rooms which also shows a deck with a hot tub.

This is quite a nice design program, sort of like a CAD program - but you won't need an engineering degree!
