





Illustrator 10 Review

I was beginning to believe that Illustrator was simply just another graphics program. I even thought it was similar to PhotoShop. Then a friend pointed out to me that Illustrator is an excellent vector drawing program. So, I launched the program for the fifth time, but rather than use clip art on my blank canvas, I chose to draw a picture from scratch. Since this review of Illustrator 10 is a bit overdue, I chose to draw something simple, and decided to draw a tree.



From the first time I used Illustrator,s tools to draw, I was hooked. It has the smoothest pen tool - I can see why it is the industry standard for graphic designers. Since Illustrator is an Adobe product, it works well with other Adobe products, such as PhotoShop and InDesign. As a matter of fact, once I drew my tree in Illustrator, I opened the tree file in PhotoShop and created many layers of color, just to see how the two programs worked together.

But back to the vector drawing in Illustrator. If you've ever drawn a line in any graphics program you know that the line has a little box at each end, which is known as its anchor points. When you draw a curved line, there are control handles extending from the anchor

points, and there are extra anchor points between the two end points. You also have choices in regards to the thickness of your line, its color, whether it's solid or dashed, and so on. When you have created a shape, you can fill it with a color, which can be solid, patterned, textured, gradient, and more.

Illustrator 10 comes with many predefined object shapes such as square, triangle, circle, star, etc. These objects can be altered to suit your needs by using the anchor points and control handles, thickness, color, and fill. Illustrator has a unique tool to modify your colors. Let,s say you are using CMYK colors. That,s cyan, magenta, yellow, and black. In Illustrator you can modify one component, say magenta to 80%, and the other colors are modified automatically in relation to your change. It's a simple to perform task. In the Paint Style window, just hold down the shift key as you drag the slider under the color you want to modify. It's that simple.

Another way you can customize Illustrator is by taking the tool you use the most on the tool palette and creating its own palette. You simply grab the tool with your cursor and drag it away from the tool palette. Now you can let your favorite tool palette float right near your drawing where you can reach it quickly.

Take the time to learn the keyboard shortcuts, rather than going to the tool palette. The software CD came with an easy-to-use instruction book. It also came with a handy reference chart which shows the shortcuts as well as where tools can be found in the palettes. It,s quite handy and helpful.

Oh, I could go on and on. There are so many examples in the Illustrator manual that I want to try on my own computer. Finding the time is the problem....
