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Computer Confidence for Women (And Others) Part III

'Creating Art on Your Computer'

What can you do with your Wacom graphic tablet? If you're a traditional artist who uses a canvas to draw or paint, you'll find that you can sketch and paint in your favorite medium on the tablet. The digital pen that is packaged with each tablet can be turned into a digital paintbrush - dipping into oils and watercolors has never been easier. Turn the pen into colored pencils or chalks if that is the medium you prefer. The tablets come bundled with software that allow you to choose the different mediums.

Digital artists using a mouse to alter their photos will find the graphic tablet's pen has a tremendous advantage over a mouse. Kimberly Elko, a Wacom representative, noted, "I tried the mouse when I first used the tablet, but I prefer using the pen." Elko laughed and added, "Using a mouse is like drawing with a brick."

The tablets allow you to insert a photograph under a piece of vellum. You can then trace over areas of the photograph which you want to capture on your computer. Your tracing lines will appear on your monitor as you trace, and you have many options to choose from in regards to the colors, thickness, and textures of your tracing lines.

As Kimberly demonstrated at the

December LAMUG meeting, the pen's pressure sensitivity can be adjusted to hundreds of different levels, depending on what you wish to create. The professional tablet, Intuos2, has over a thousand different pressure-sensitivity levels. "Being able to control the pressure of the pen gives you ultimate control in what appears in your document or art. It's just a matter of pressing harder or softer to alter the brush size, opacity, or color," explained Kimberly.

The LAMUG audience, made up of friends and both long-time and new members, watched as Kimberly went through different effects created by adjusting the pressure sensitivity, such as dodging and burning, cloning, and creating layer masks. Going from soft pressure to hard pressure, and back to soft pressure, and from red to blue and back to red, the lines' curves stayed smooth and the colors made the most gradual transitions.

One of the interesting effects of a Wacom tablet is to colorize black and white photos. "It's best to start with your photo in the RGB mode. Use the lasso tool to draw around the area you want to color," said Kimberly. "One of my favorite suggestions is to set the pen tip so that one of the buttons is the option key - the same as the option key on your keyboard."

Most digital editing applications allow the user to create new layers. By creating a new layer, you can work on the area of

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the black and white photo you traced with the lasso tool without changing the original photo. "You can use your pen on the tablet to choose menu items. The pen only needs to hover over the tablet's surface and you'll see that as you move the pen, the mouse moves on the screen. To select an item, just touch the pen to the tablet's surface," noted Kimberly.

To colorize the black and white photo, go to Image > Adjust > Hue/Saturation. Click on the 'Colorize' button and move the arrows to create the color you want. You'll notice that the new layer will show the area you lassoed and it will become colored as you choose. Let's say you are colorizing a black and white photo of a face, as Kimberly demonstrated. Remember when she colored the gal's face and added some blush to the cheeks?

"Adding blush is easy because you can adjust the effects as you want. Set the airbrush to 'Hue' to choose your color, and the pressure or opacity to low. By having the second button on your pen set to 'Eraser', you can quickly change mistakes or overcoloring," stated Kimberly. "Change the hue to color other parts of the face. You can also lasso other areas of the original photo and put them on a separate layer."

There may be times when you wish to add your signature to a document. With the Wacom tablets, you can. Just write your signature on the tablet which will then be captured on your computer. You can now copy and paste your signature into an email or other documents. Being able to write on the tablet and capture it on the screen is a feature used often by people who give alot of presentations as part of their job.

Digital artists will find the realistic art strokes that can be created with the Wacom graphic tablets are truly amazing. Each tablet comes bundled with software that allows you to start 'painting' and 'drawing' immediately. Plus, you can guickly and easily go back and forth between your favorite applications, such as PhotoShop and PainterClassic. Chalk, felt pens, charcoals, oils, and pencils, as well as different types of paper and canvas textures, accommodate artistic preferences. Imagine being able to mix water colors and other mediums right on the screen. The Wacom tablet's technology is truly amazing.

Do you have special photos you would like to combine with other photos for special effects, such as the soldier's photo that Kimberly combined with the American flag? Where do you get professional quality photos like that? I have been working with photo/graphics software from Hemera (www.hemera.com) and give it a thumbs up. Stay tuned for more articles on how to use the Wacom graphics tablet in conjunction with Hemera's 'The Big Box of Art' and 'Photo-Objects' professional photos and graphics.

I won a copy of DragStick® at the LAMUG Christmas party and, at first, I didn't think I had a use for it. After all, I had well organized files and numerous convenient aliases. Why would I need anything else?


DragStrip® is a program that really grows on you and, over time, has a way of making itself indispensable even when you don't think you need it. For example, I've worked on computers for about a decade, long enough to create a zillion files with a ga-zillion documents and lots of different systems for organizing my ever growing hard drive.

All of which was precisely my problem. Some of my aliases were under my apple menu, some were on my desktop and some were in my hard drive. DragStrip® let me create strips of aliases for selected files, applications and documents conveniently located in one place. Each strip can be custom produced for my needs.

I have a strip of all the basics I want available which opens whenever I boot up my computer. I also have a strip devoted to my scanner and a strip created from my archives. When I boot up my computer, DragStick® launches as well and opens my strip of basics at the same time. So, I
